Dear Colleagues,

Frustration is growing over inaction in Congress to pass a federal transportation bill or support historical iurisdictional relationships. The problems - no consensus on new funding, who has authority over existing funding and, for the first time, no consensus that federal spending on infrastructure is good for the country. Congress is back in session this week and a priority will be to test Keystone Pipeline funding through an extension. NARC has held hundreds of meetings to discuss the importance of the localregional-state-federal

Congress is in session.

Federal Transportation Authorization Update: The U.S. House of Representatives is expected to begin consideration of legislation that would push forward the Keystone Pipeline project in an attempt to tie it to the U.S. Senate-passed transportation authorization. It is also possible that the House will ask for an additional, short-term authorization extension to garner additional time to negotiate a compromise between the House and Senate. The current short-term federal surface transportation authorization extension expires on June 30, 2012.

Senate Appropriations Update: The U.S. Senate Appropriations Committee is scheduled to consider the FY13 Transportation; Housing and Urban Development; and Related Agencies apropriation's bills tomorrow, Tuesday, April 17, 2012.

HUD Choice Neighborhood Grant Applications Available

Deadline: May 1, 2012

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has announced the availability of Choice Neighborhood Planning Grants. The planning grants can be used to create a comprehensive neighborhood revitalization strategy to transform public or assisted housing within a distressed neighborhood. Public Housing Authorities, local governments, tribal entities, nonprofits and for-profits that apply jointly with a public entity may apply. Roadmaps to Health Community Grants

Deadline: May 2, 2012

The Roadmaps to Health Community Grants program will support communities to implement policy or system changes to address one of the social or economic factors that, as defined by the County Health Rankings, most strongly influence health outcomes in their community. Applicants must engage community members in the planning and implementation of projects, and must collaborate with organizations having expertise in improving the health of the public. Applicants must secure 100 percent matching support, including a cash match of at least 50 percent with the balance as in-kind support. Deadline: Brief proposals May 2, 2012. USDA Funding Available for Local Food and Farmers Market Promotion

Deadline: May 9, 2012

Funding to improve marketing for domestic farmers' markets and other local/regional food programs is available through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Market Promotion Program (FMPP). In FY12, has approximately \$10 million in funding, with a \$100,000 ceiling for each award to an eligible local government, nonprofit or other organization. USDA Rural Community Development Initiative Grant Opportunity

Application Deadline May 9, 2012

USDA Rural Development will award up to \$8.6 million in grants that help rural businesses create jobs and spur economic development. Local governments, tribes, and public and private non-profit intermediary organizations that provide financial and technical assistance to multiple recipients are eligible to apply for grants that would benefit a recipient located in a low-income rural area. The intermediary must provide matching funds greater than or equal to the award. Proposals should consist of projects that provide technical assistance and capacity building to local organizations to complete housing, economic development and community facilities projects. The Rural Jobs and Innovation Accelerator Challenge Grant Opportunity

Application Deadline: May 9, 2012

The Rural Jobs and Innovation Accelerator Challenge is a multi-agency effort that will give out approximately 20 awards to projects that benefit rural communities. Funds awarded can be used to support a range of projects including improving rural communities' ability to undertake or accelerate projects related to housing, community facilities, or economic and community development along with the creation of regional linkages that connect communities with innovation clusters and regional opportunities leading to job creation, expanded markets and economic growth. Climate Change and Health: Assessing and Modeling Population Vulnerability to Climate Change

Application Deadline: May 24, 2012

This Funding Opportunity Announcement is being issued by the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) of the National Institutes of Health (NIH) with participation from the following NIH components: FIC, NCI, NCMHD NHLBI, NIA, NIBIB, NICHD, NLM and OBSSR. It encourages research applications to examine the differential risk factors of populations that lead to or are associated with increased vulnerability to exposures, diseases and other adverse health outcomes related to climate change. Applications may involve either applied research studies that address specific hypotheses about risk factors or population characteristics associated with increased vulnerability, or research projects to develop general models or methods for identifying and characterizing population vulnerability to climate change. The ultimate goal of this research program is to help inform climate change adaptation and public health interventions to reduce current and future vulnerability of various populations to the health effects of climate change. Applications are anticipated to involve a multidisciplinary research team, including experts in health sciences and climatology as well as geography, modeling, statistics, demography, and social and behavioral sciences as appropriate. EDA FY 2012 Disaster Relief Opportunity

Application Deadline: Rolling

The FY 2012 Disaster Relief Opportunity awards investments in regions experiencing severe economic stress as a result of natural disasters that were declared as major Federal disasters between October 1, 2010 and September 30, 2011. Applications should be based on long-term, regionally oriented and collaborative economic development or

redevelopment strategies that incorporate principles for enhancing the resiliency of the relevant region. In addition, applicants must demonstrate a clear nexus between their proposed project scope of work and disaster recovery and resiliency efforts. Applicants must come from counties that had a Presidential declaration of a major disaster. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis and processed as received.
