Sunday Tours (\$50 each, per person – non registered guests welcome):

Boys Town: History and New Development Tour

Hop aboard a motorcoach to the Boys Town campus where 101 years ago Father Flanagan started his mission of caring for abused and underprivileged children and learn how Boys Town has grown into a national presence over the years. Following the guided tour of sites in historic Boys Town Village, visitors will head to the nearby Heartwood Preserve, for a look at a project creating a unique urban core in suburban West Omaha.

Urban Revitalization in the Big O

Travel by bus to neighborhoods on both the Omaha and Council Bluffs sides of the Missouri River that resurged through redevelopment efforts. Stops will include Rivers Edge, the 100 Block in Council Bluffs, South 24th Street in the heart of Omaha's Latino community in South Omaha; the Blackstone District, and Midtown Crossing in Midtown Omaha; and the Highlander Development in North Omaha.

Tuesday Tours (\$25 each, per person – non registered guests welcome):

Bike Tour

Jump on a Heartland B-Cycle and join a local biking enthusiast and planner for a 90-minute tour (of relatively flat terrain) and learn the history of neighborhoods near and around Downtown and Midtown Omaha. For those unsure about pedaling for 90 minutes, Heartland B-Cycle is adding electric-assist bikes to its fleet in May. (B-Cycles and helmets provided.)

CWS: Behind the Scenes

Omaha is home to the College World Series every June. Take a behind-the-scenes tour of TD Ameritrade Park as final preparations are put in place for one of the biggest summer events in the Omaha metro region.

Monday and Tuesday mornings, time TBD (no charge, all welcome):

Jogging with Jeff and Jason

Get some exercise each morning with a 45-minute run and tour of neighborhoods along the Missouri Riverfront led by staff from the Metropolitan Area Planning Agency (MAPA) and Metro Transit. These will be an out and back to the hotel so participants can get cleaned up before the first sessions of the day.

Potential routes include: a run across the Bob Kerrey Pedestrian Bridge and the Missouri River from Omaha to Council Bluffs, IA and the Rivers Edge development. Another run will be around Downtown Omaha and will highlight some of its history and development. A third option will travel through the Little Italy neighborhood with possibly one last run through NoDo (North Downtown) around the New North Makerhood.
