Congress Brief

 ${\bf Senate\,Transportation\,Appropriations\,Subcommittee\,Approves\,2017\,Spending\,Bill}$

Earlier today, the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies Subcommittee of the Senate Appropriations Committee unanimously passed a \$77.9 billion spending bill for USDOT and HUD programs in FY2017. The bill fully funds the authorization levels for Highway Trust Fund programs as were authorized in the recent FAST Act transportation reauthorization. Additionally, the bill increases discretionary appropriations for USDOT by \$454 million over FY2016 levels and increases HUD appropriations by nearly \$1.5 billion. To pay for this increased spending, the Senate bill would rescind more than \$2.2 billion in unobligated highway contract authority.

A few programs of particular interest:

- TIGER Program: **NARC sent a letter to appropriators** supporting the administration's \$1.25 billion request for TIGER discretionary grants. The Senate bill funds TIGER well below that, at \$525 million. This figure does, however, represent a \$25 million increase over the FY2016 TIGER funding level.
- Capital Investment Grants (FTA): NARC requested that appropriators match the FAST Act funding levels for Capital Investment Grants (New Starts, Small Starts). The Senate actually went beyond FAST Act levels, providing nearly \$2.4 billion (compared to just over \$2.3 billion).
- Notably, though not surprisingly, the Senate bill does not contain the administration's \$17.9 billion 21st Century Clean Transportation Plan, which it proposed by pay for with a new crude oil fee.

Senate Passes FAA Reauthorization Bill

On Tuesday, the Senate passed its FAA reauthorization bill by a resounding 95-3. The 18-month bill does not include a final bipartisan package of 26 amendments that lawmakers were hoping to include. The package was dropped when Senator Rand Paul (R-KY), who wanted consideration of an unrelated amendment, refused to allow adoption by unanimous consent. Earlier, the Senate also dropped a package of renewable energy tax breaks. The bill includes several security and safety provisions, drone regulations, and consumer reforms on airline baggage fees and refunds.

In the House, Bill Shuster (R-PA), Chairman of the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, released a statement following the passage of the bill stating that he will look at the Senate bill but will continue to push for air traffic control privatization in his version. This leaves a huge question mark as to whether a final bill can be completed before the July 15 expiration.

FHWA System Performance NPRM

Earlier this week, FHWA released a copy of the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) proposing national performance measures regarding performance of the National Highway System, Freight Movement on the Interstate System, and the CMAQ program. This is an advanced copy of the NPRM; the official version will be released tomorrow, April 22. This is the third of three rules from FHWA establishing national measures of performance, and is by far the most extensive and farreaching of the three. This rule will have implications for MPOs and for the planning process in general. You can find the **current advanced copy** of the NPRM on the FHWA website.

USDOT Announces Projects Selected for Clean Buses & Infrastructure

Seven grant projects - totaling \$22.5 million in grants - have been selected as part of USDOT's Low and No-emission Vehicle Deployment Program to improve buses and bus facilities. Among the projects selected, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is sponsoring two grants to expand an electric bus program in their region.

New Transit Connectivity Database

A new website, **AllTransit**, combines transit data such as routes, stops, and frequency from 805 transit agencies across the country to show connectivity throughout the United States. The tool shows information on access to jobs and housing and can help users explore the options and effectiveness of transit networks in their region.

Tucson Alt-fuel Buses Take Aim at Childhood Asthma

The Pima Association of Governments (PAG) program, Tucson Clean Cities, has replaced several school buses in the area with alternative fuel vehicles as part of a grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The retrofitted buses run on compressed natural gas and propane and are quieter and cheaper to maintain than their previous diesel buses. Changes such as this are helping the region meet air quality emissions standards and provide health benefits such as reducing asthma in children.
