States Face Steep Cut in Transportation Funding if Congress Fails to Act: U.S. DOT is again stressing the urgency of finding a solution to the Highway Trust Fund (HTF) crisis. The HTF will be effectively insolvent about a month from now. U.S. DOT Secretary Anthony Foxx stated that this would require the department to cut payments to states by as much as 28 percent. House and Senate Committees Approve Differing Short-Term HTF

Fixes: This morning, the U.S. House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee passed a stopgap bill (H.R. 5021 – *Highway and Transportation Funding Act of 2014*) to extend HTF solvency until May 31, 2015. The one-time \$10.8 billion (B) measure transfers \$8.8B to the Highway Account (including \$1B from the Leaking Underground Storage Tank (LUST) Trust Fund) and \$2.0B to the Mass Transit Account, offset by so-called pension smoothing provisions and extension of Customs user fees. The bill was approved in Committee today by voice vote, raising hopes the bill will pass under "suspension of the rules" early next week. The bill can be found **HERE**.

This afternoon, the U.S. Senate Finance Committee took up its own measure to provide a HTF patch. The modified Finance version (*Preserving America's Transit and Highways Act* of 2014) provides the same \$10.8B in funding, including a \$1.0B LUST transfer and similar – though not identical – offsets. The Senate bill is bipartisan, with support from Chairman Wyden (D-OR) and Ranking Member Hatch (R-UT), and passed by voice vote with Sen. Carper (D-DE) voting "no." Sen. Carper's "no" vote stems largely from his opposition to the additional funding that was added to the bill, carrying it through the end of next May. He feels a shorter duration would hold Congress to completing a longer-term reauthorization bill during the lame duck session; his

amendment on this failed 10-14. More information about the Senate Finance bill is **HERE**.

Though the bills differ, their similarities in total funding and offsets indicate a path toward compromise on an extension that carries through May 2015, rather than through the end of 2014.

State and Local Elected Officials Support Long-Term

Transportation Funding: In a letter to House and Senate leadership, leaders from a number of national associations that represent state, county, and municipal officials – including the National Association of Counties and the National League of Cities – urged Congress to solve the impending HTF crisis and pass a long-term reauthorization to replace MAP-21. The letter cites the need for a strong commitment from the federal government and the uncertainty that arises from short-term extensions and temporary patches. Click **HERE** for the letter.

New Publication Detailing Oregon's Per-Mile Charging Program

Released: Oregon is a leader in innovative transportation funding measures, and recently established the nation's first ever *Road Usage Charge Program* for light vehicles. Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) has just released a report, *Road Usage Charge Pilot Program 2013 & Per-Mile Charge Policy in Oregon*, that details how Oregon successfully designed and completed its second per-mile charge pilot program and ultimately passed legislation to establish a fully operational road usage charging program, to launch July 1, 2015. Other states and even Congress are sure to take notice, as the so-called vehicle miles traveled (VMT) tax is a hot topic among those looking for alternatives to the current per-gallon gasoline tax.
