Your NARC Staff will continue to monitor the Federal Government shutdown and debt ceiling debate, providing another update for you later this week, as additional information becomes available.

Finally, we welcome a new Program Associate this week, Taylor Markwith, who will be assisting with our solar Appropriations Update: Congress continues to work on funding FY14 and ending government shutdown. The House, at the opposition of the Senate, is still pushing through one-off FY14 funding bills to reopen parts of the government. Meanwhile, many congressional members are stating that the spending and debt limit issues will be resolved in unison. No comprehensive, clean solution to end the shutdown has made any successful movement through both chambers. Appalachian Regional Commission: Livable Communities Assistance

Deadline: October 18, 2013

The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), in partnership with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), is offering assistance to Appalachian communities through the Livable Communities program, which helps small towns and rural communities improve their livability by promoting economic development while safeguarding the local landscape. The 2013 program will focus on developing local food systems as a means of promoting economic diversification. Up to five selected communities will receive a total of up to \$250,000 in technical assistance and implementation support. The deadline for application has been extended to October 18, 2013. Federal Emergency Management Agency – Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program

Deadline: October 18, 2013

The Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) program provides funds to states, territories, Indian tribal governments, communities, and universities for hazard mitigation planning and the implementation of mitigation projects prior to a disaster event. Funding these plans and projects reduces overall risks to the population and structures, while also reducing reliance on funding from actual disaster declarations. PDM grants are to be awarded on a competitive basis and without reference to state allocations, quotas, or other formula-based allocation of funds. More information is available HERE.
